Tom S will keep his website up to date, so you can reference it often. This has worked well in the past.

Congratulations to Mia and Andy! They are expecting in March. It also means that they have dropped off our trip. Our wait list has cleared. Pete Rysted and Louis Swanepoel have joined. There is one slot open.

Bill Kinner has won a permit for September 14, 2022! From the National Park Service's (NPS) perspective he is the trip leader and is legally responsible for all of our behavior. If Bill does not go, none of us can go. I am the "qualified boat-operator" (NPS term) and I am responsible for knowing the river, the equipment and assuring that we have the experience as a group to be on the river. From a practical perspective, I am the coordinator and leader of the group as a whole with a lot of help from Tom Strauch. Tom is coordinating the food. We will have only one food group.

The last day for motorized craft is September 15. That means for the first two or three days we may have a few motorized commercial trips pass us, but after that none of the other groups will have motors, and therefore very few commercial trips.

We have selected Canyon REO as our outfitter. By reserving early, we have saved save a significant amount of money. The last few times we have used Canyon REO and have been very pleased with them. I have paid a deposit and they have committed to rent us five 18' rafts.

Currently 15 of 16 slots are filled. I expect the trip to cost around \$1500 each for 21 days on the river. If we have fewer people or we do major damage to the equipment the cost could be a little more. So far, every other trip that we have organized has been less than \$1500. Everyone who is on our list has sent a \$500 deposit. Bill has paid the Park Service \$400.

NEXT ACTION ITEMS:

- If there is any change to your ID (like a new address), let me know
- Let me know your tentative logistic plans – whether you plan on flying to Flagstaff or whether you are driving to Flagstaff or to Lees Ferry. If you are driving, where do you want your vehicle at the end of the trip. I would like to have a rough idea on how many vehicles we will need Canyon REO to store or shuttle or if it will be necessary to have Canyon REO drive us in their van. Let me know your best guess. I do expect some changes.

Time Line:

Now – Send \$500 deposit to Tim (for those joining the trip)

March 2021 – Tim paid deposit to outfitter

April 30, 2022– All participants have final payment to Tim Strauch – I expect it to be an additional \$1000

June 1, 2022 – Tim sends in completed permit and pays National Park fees – estimated at about \$1000

June 2, 2022 – Request final trip estimates from Outfitter (this will include add ons)

June 6, 2022 – 90 days until launch date – anyone added to our permit will be charged an additional \$100 (so \$190) by the National Park Service.

Early June, 2022 – The Park Service will issue our permit.

July 3, 2019 – Tim sends approximately \$9000 - 50% of invoice to Canyon REO

Monday, September 12, 2022 – If you are flying into Flagstaff you probably want to arrive Monday evening and stay at the Aspen Hotel.

Tuesday, September 13, 2022 – You will want to be in Flagstaff at the outfitters by 9:00 am. After Canyon REO's orientation, we will travel to Lees Ferry – the put-in.

Tuesday, September 13, 2022 – Pay Canyon REO remaining balance (\$9000 range)

Tuesday, September 13, midafternoon – We will rig the rafts. When this is complete the ranger will inspect our gear

Tuesday, September 13, dinner – for those who want to - we will eat at the Marble Canyon Lodge

Tuesday, September 13, night – Most of us will camp at the boater camp near the put-in at Lees Ferry. If you would like to spend your last night in a hotel you can make reservation at the Marble Canyon Lodge.

Wednesday, September 14 – morning – Ranger talk and the ranger inspection of each person's ID. (make sure you have a valid picture ID available) – LAUNCH!!

Wednesday, September 20, 2020 - Exchange at Phantom Ranch (if needed)

Saturday, October 1, 2022 – pass Diamond Creek (mile 226)

Tuesday, October 4, 2022 – take out at Pearce Ferry (mile 280)

The permit allows 16 participants on the river at any one time. Exchanges are allowed, but park fees (\$90) must be paid for each individual whether you are on the river for 21 days or 1 day.

Total Cost of Trip:

I expect the cost of our 21-day trip to be about \$1500 each; for just the first part about \$700; for just the second part about \$1100. This includes all communal equipment, food, shuttle to and from Flagstaff, and park registration fees. It does not include snacks, beer, wine and transportation to Flagstaff. Normally, about a month after our trip, Canyon REO has inspected the equipment and we receive a refund for the damage deposit. At that point, I send a refund to everyone else. It is possible, but unlikely, that I could ask everyone for more money.

Car Shuttle

Current car shuttle prices by Canyon REO are: from Flagstaff to the Pearce Ferry take-out is \$185. The shuttle cost from Lees Ferry to Flagstaff is \$150. The storage fee (third party from Canyon REO) is \$40. Lees Ferry to Pearce is \$375.

Logistic for the start of the trip (subject to frequent changes):

You can either start the trip Monday evening in Flagstaff, or be at Lees Ferry by noon on Tuesday.

Those that are flying in or those driving from the east and returning to the east are probably best-off being in Flagstaff Monday evening.

Those driving from the west and returning to the west could go directly to Lees Ferry.

For those that are doing additional travel before or after the Grand, we can look at those logistics individually.

Those that will be in Flagstaff Monday night will need to be at Canyon REO in Flagstaff by 9:00 am on Tuesday, September 13 for Canyon REO's orientation to their equipment. Their orientation is very worthwhile. Tom Strauch, who has attended this orientation multiple times, prefers to drive directly to the put-in at Lees Ferry, and then have his car shuttled to Pearce Ferry. Most of us will be at the Aspen Hotel on Monday, September 12. It is a good base and people can consider arriving even earlier and staying extra days in Flagstaff. It is helpful to all of us to know each other individual plans. If you are flying, and someone is already in Flagstaff they might be able to pick you up at the airport. If you are driving, you might car pool with other people that are driving. If you have questions about the put-in, Flagstaff or take-out, please ask. I have had much experience with many different options. After the Canyon REO orientation we will drive to Lees Ferry. The Canyon REO equipment truck can take 3 or 4 people at no additional charge. The rest can travel in our cars to Lees Ferry. These cars will be shuttled back to Flagstaff. All of our personal equipment may be placed in the equipment truck. If we do not have enough cars to transport us from Flagstaff to Lees Ferry, Canyon REO will drive us in their van. Using our own cars is more economical.

Once at Lees Ferry, we will rig the rafts. The ranger will inspect our gear. We will have dinner at Marble Canyon Lodge and then spend the night at the boater's camp near the put in.

Logistic for the exchange at Phantom Ranch (subject to frequent changes)

If we have an exchange, it will likely be on Wednesday, September 20.

Logistic for the end of the trip (subject to frequent changes)

We will be taking out at Pearce Ferry. Those heading west will have their cars shuttled there. This is far more convenient for all of us heading west and north rather than returning to Flagstaff. The equipment truck expects to show up around 11:00 am. By that time, we should have all the boats derigged. It should take us less than two hours to load the truck and be on our way. Canyon REO does not need us to help unload the equipment in Flagstaff. Please let me know if you will need a ride back to Flagstaff. Canyon REO has room for up to five passengers in the equipment truck. If we shuttle five cars there would be no room for any of us to go back to Flagstaff (the five shuttle drivers would need a ride back). If you are flying, you should plan to fly out of Las Vegas. It should be safe to catch a flight on Tuesday, October 4 at 7:00 pm or later. (It is about 2 ½ hours to Las Vegas and the first of our cars should be

driving through Vegas by mid-afternoon, however there can be traffic jams in Vegas and shit does happen on the river.) Any one driving directly back to Oregon and Washington will be going through Vegas and could drop you off at the airport.

Tim– Will coordinate plans with Bill, Vern and Ron and also with Holly and Michael. He plans on driving

Tom – Will drive to Lees Ferry. From Pearce Ferry he will do the 17 hour drive back to Salem in time to go to work on Wednesday, October 5.

Holly and Michael – Will need to decide whether they are flying, or coordinating with either Tim or Tom.

Bill, Vern and Ron – Most likely driving. Coordinate plans with each other and Tim.

Sam - Mostly likely flying.

Bo - “Bo will drive out”

Polk – Mostly likely flying.

Mark– “I plan to drive up to Flagstaff Sep 12th and stay at the Aspen. And I would like my car shuttled to Pierce Ferry on take out day--like our last trip. That worked out well.”

Ray – Most likely driving from Santa Fe, NM to Flagstaff. His car will be stored in Flagstaff and he can catch a ride from Pearce Ferry back to Flagstaff.

AJ – Not sure of her plans. May coordinate with Tim, like she did last time.

Pete – I assume wants car shuttled to Pearce. If he flies, he would catch a ride to Las Vegas.

Louis – I assume he will travel with Mark, but need to confirm

Daylight:

In September we will have 11-13 hours of daylight. We will want to take advantage of the daylight hours by getting up and starting early.

Hiking:

On all river trips, there are those who like to hike and there are those who prefer to relax and hang out in camp. Grand Canyon trips can accommodate both and everything in between. Our group is very oriented toward hiking.

Camp Chairs:

I feel that one of the most important items to bring along on the trip is a camp chair. It represents your personal space at camp and around the camp fire. For some unknown reason, on the few trips that I have been on that had less chairs than people, there have been disagreements about chairs and space. Please bring your own camp chair.

Equipment:

The outfitter will supply almost all of the river equipment. REO will not supply extra dry bags and life jackets. Most of us have our own river gear. Please let me know if you do not or if you have extra that you can share. I have about 5 large dry bags that I can share. Canyon REO will rent both life jacket and a large dry bag for \$25 each for the whole trip. For the most part you should be able to get your personal gear in one large dry bag, or two medium ones. This does not include tents or chairs.

I strongly recommend Aquaphor, a skin ointment for your hand and feet. Your hand and feet will become cracked and dry as a result of being wet most of the time. Wearing gloves can also help your hands. It is recommended that you start using Aquaphor a week before the trip to moisturize your hands and feet.

In September at Phantom Ranch the average lows are 68 degrees and the average high are 95. It will mostly be sunny and warm, but be prepared for anything. Wet suits and dry suits are not included as

part of the equipment. At this time of year, they are not really needed unless you plan to spend a lot of time in the water. You will want clothing that will keep you warm when you are wet. It is likely that we will have some very hot days, but we could also have some cool ones.

Snack, drinks, beer and wine

Even though the outfitter will supply us with plenty of food you may still want to bring your own snacks. There is plenty of space so you can bring as much as you want of drinks. Do not bring any glass. Soda and beer should be in cans and wine in bags (a small glass container of hard liquor is OK). There will be plenty of filtered water and everyone is encouraged to drink plenty of water. If you prefer to bring your own drinks up to four or five cases is acceptable.

NPS Regulations:

Can I change my passenger list or gear after sending you my trip application?

Participant names may be changed online before launch. Before going to Lees Ferry, ensure that each participant will have picture ID and the total number of participants (including the permittee) does not exceed 16 at any one time (8 for a small trip). The trip leader must be present the entire trip. You may change or add boats at Lees Ferry. Just be sure to show up with the required gear associated with the additions. Between 30 and 90 days before launch, the trip leader will be allowed to request that additional trip participants be added to the trip. For these late additions there will be the normal \$110 charge per added person plus an additional late fee of \$100 per added person. Trip participants may not be added within 30 days of launch.
